	These roles would themselves require an academic background, generally involving A-Level or equivalent Level 3 qualifications and a degree
Skills required:	You'll need:
	 a solid driving skill set (most professional drivers begin racing karts and move up from there) the ability to act as a team player to be flexible / adaptable to changing circumstances (both in and out of the racing arena)
	high levels of concentration
	 commitment excellent physical health
What you'll do:	Outside of the racing season the driver will need to take responsibility for maintaining health and will likely keep racing skills sharp, for example via the use of simulators
	During the racing season a typical race weekend programme for a driver would include
	The driver flies into the racetrack and spends some time with the team, checking that his car is okay and working out strategy for the weekend. The driver spends most of the rest of the time before a race in practice and technical debriefs, when the team evaluates the set-up of the car and its performance. The qualification procedure then takes place ahead of the race itself
What you'll earn:	 The average salary is £750,000 The salaries of the other roles noted above range from £40,000 to £60,000
Working hours, patterns and	During the racing season you will be mostly focused on the weekend of the race as your "working hours"
environment:	The other roles noted above would likely fit in to a more regular working pattern but include some weekends and evenings
